


This booklet uses easy words and pictures.


You might want to ask someone to help you read it.

A Caesarean is an operation and is always done in hospital.



You can have someone with you, a birth partner.





medicine

A midwife will also be with you to support.

Everyone, including your birth partner, will change into theatre clothing known as Scrubs.

You will be given some medicine so it does not hurt during the operation.



This is usually via a needle into your back a spinal injection.

This will make your legs feel heavy and numb.






Or you may be put to sleep.

This is very rare as we want you to be awake when your baby is born.

We have other easy read leaflets about having a general anaesthetic (being put to sleep).








The team will check that the medicine (anaesthetic) is working before they start the Caesarean.


They will cover you with a surgical drape.

This is a sheet that will keep you covered and clean during your Caesarean.

Your tummy will be cleaned with soap.

This will help to prevent any infection.






This only stays in while your legs are numb and you cannot get to the toilet.




You may feel your tummy being moved but you should not feel pain.

cut in tummy




A cut will be made low down in your tummy.

You will not feel this.



This is to make an opening for your baby to be born.



After your baby has been born the opening in your tummy will be closed with stitches.




When your baby is born the Dr will need to check inside your vagina.

tablet up your bum hole



see your baby

They will give you pain relief medicine into your bottom as a suppository - this is a tablet up your bum hole.




You will be supported to hold your baby if you want to.



Afterwards you will be taken to an area to recover before going to the postnatal ward.



Our staff will support you and your baby throughout your hospital stay.



If you are having a contraceptive implant placed this will be done in hospital.



Please ask any staff if you need any help or support.



There are some risks to a Caesarean and we have another leaflet to read before you decide to have this operation.
